Derbyshire Cadets' quick actions are recognised.

A group of Cadets from **Derbyshire VPC** have been awarded the Duke of Edinburgh Award – This is Youth All Stars Ward (Team Category). The team received their award from the Duke of Edinburgh at Buckingham Palace.

Back in May 2024, six Derbyshire volunteer police cadets – Amelie, Bethan, Clarissa, Emilia, Teri and Rosie – set off on their Bronze expedition, their first major outing together.

Little did they know that before reaching the second checkpoint on day one, they would need to deal with a medical emergency, and that their quick actions would potentially save one of their teammates' lives.



When Cadet Teri collapsed and lost consciousness en-route, the group acted swiftly and decisively. Each member took on a specific role – contacting their Leaders, keeping Teri warm, and talking to her to provide comfort until she regained consciousness. They also recorded detailed notes of their actions to share with emergency responders.



Their first aid and CPR training, along with lessons on using police radios and backup phones, proved invaluable in this critical moment. The cadets had rehearsed protocols for emergencies, ensuring they felt prepared and confident.

Through their training and trust from their Leaders, Cadet Amelie says they instinctively *"knew what to do"*. Meanwhile, Emilia says that the biggest lesson she learned from the experience was that *"teamwork is the best cution"*.

Derbyshire VPC leader, Dom (pictured right) said *"When the group wanted to continue* their expedition, I felt very proud of them for the fact that they wanted to carry on and keep moving. This is everything we try to instil in our young people."

The Derbyshire police cadets were nominated for All-stars of the Year by Dom, who highlights how *"the actions of this group demonstrate a great example of young people working together. They calmly, as a team, managed to pull together to help resolve the incident."*

Young Cyber Security Ambassadors begin their journey

Yorkshire & Humber Regional Organised Crime Unit (YHROCU) have launched a new initiative, Young Cyber Security Ambassadors (YCSA) Programme sponsored by Amazon Web Services.

YOUNG CYBER SECURITY AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME

The YCSA programme seeks to provide existing Volunteer Police Cadets who have an interest in computing and technology with a 12-month programme of training and volunteering opportunities across the Yorkshire & Humber region, alongside YHROCU and Force Cyber Crime teams.



'Cyber Ambassadors will receive a programme of education delivered by Police in collaboration with our Partners, including British Esports, Amazon Web Services, Sheffield Hallam University, CiiSec, SudoCyber, CyberFirst and many more. These informative sessions will equip Young Ambassadors with key cyber security knowledge and raise awareness of the many education and career opportunities to be pursued in the future both inside and outside of policing.'

The Regional Cyber Crime Unit Detective Inspector Richard Wallis and Police Sergeant Nathan Clarke, leads for the Yorkshire & Humber team behind the inaugural YCSA programme said:

'We're excited to launch an education and volunteering programme of this nature across the Yorkshire & Humber region. The initial cohort of 23 Cyber Ambassadors have been recruited from across all 4 regional Force Volunteer Police Cadet schemes, and after an initial period of training will accompany ROCU and Force Fraud and Cyber teams at various events across our communities providing peer-topeer advice and support to keep young people safe online.



The YCSA Programme is the first of its kind across UK Policing and will undergo a formal academic evaluation before an anticipated national roll out in 2026.
